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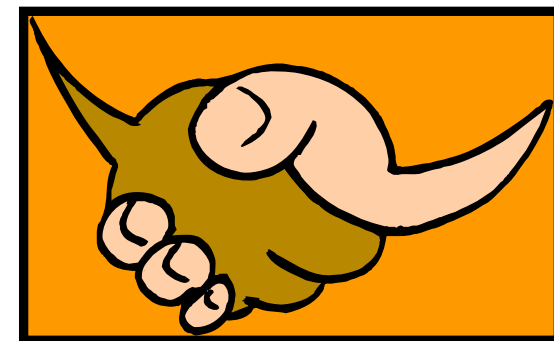
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How will PATH mentoring work?

As you prepare to come to PATH, you will be assigned to a PATH mentor.

During your training, you will be expected to meet with your mentors on a regular basis. You will need to make the necessary arrangements to make this a priority in your schedule.

Mentoring is not a one-way street. Those who have found PATH mentoring the most helpful have chosen to make it a two-way street by taking an active role in the relationship.



What is an PATH mentor?

- An experienced field missionary who is serving on staff with PATH
- A brain to pick, an ear to listen, and someone who will give a push in the right direction
- A safe place
- A prayer warrior for you
- A person who desires to empower you by sharing their God-given wisdom, experience, and habits of obedience to God's Word
- An enabler to maximize the grace of God in your life
- One who will be available as you walk through PATH
- One who does not have all the answers

Although you are assigned to a particular mentor, you will find that forming friendships with other PATH staff members will be an additional blessing of friendship – each one having wisdom and experience to share.
